
Mayor Dominy closed the meeting by thanking all in attendance and again acknowledged our many volunteers, as they are the backbone of our community.


This letter will serve to summarize the accomplishments of the Environmental Commission during calendar year 2019:

- We are continuing to rebuild and extend boardwalks in challenging areas of the Break Back Run and Mantua Creek Trails. These improvements are wider and better anchored to the ground than those previously in place. They are being built to withstand heavy rains and should last for many years to come.
  - We had to respond to two graffiti incidents this summer: a minor one involving a railroad culvert, and a more serious one that required us to paint the floor of the Comey's Lake Tea House.
  - Also at the Tea House, we installed a new high-quality sign explaining the history of that location.
  - We published a revised pocket-sized Trail Guide for the first time in 11 years.
  - We installed a storage shed on borough property to secure our tools and high-value construction materials in an easily-accessible place.
  - We sponsored a Youth Photo Contest focused on the conservation area. The two first-place winning photographs are featured on the cover of the 2020 Borough Calendar.

- For the seventh year in a row, we engaged a professional firm to chemically treat local ponds against unsightly duckweed and algae plants during the summer months.
- We continued regular maintenance tasks, including cutting fallen trees and filling in holes on trails.
- We sponsored three public hikes, two formal work parties, and fielded teams for both Clean Communities Days. We also presented environmental awards to two graduating 6<sup>th</sup> graders.

In 2020, the Commission will continue to keep the 121-acre "Ring of Green" healthy and accessible for all to enjoy.

## Wenonah Shade Tree Commission

### 2019 Report to Council- Reorganization meeting – January 2, 2020

The Wenonah STC is an organization created by a borough ordinance that tasks us with the regulation, planting, care and control of shade trees within the clear zone – commonly known as the area between the curb and sidewalk or up to 12 feet within the curb should there be no sidewalk. We hold 7 public meetings a year in the Jack Sheppard Sr. Community Center as detailed in the calendar and borough website.

During 2019 we planted 55 new trees bringing the total plantings since 2006 to 643. This year's planting includes 4 new sycamore trees added to Wenonah Park and 2 to the Conservation area. We also planted a tree along with the entire Wenonah School 6<sup>th</sup> grade graduating class in the park celebrating Arbor Day.

35 new trees are planned for planting in 2020.

The STC responded to 57 resident and/or Public Works/Borough staff/ Police and Fire Dept. tree related concerns during 2019. We are conducting a borough wide shade tree inventory to help assist with future tree species diversity plantings. We continue to be sensitive to electric and utility wires as we plant new trees seeking to select species that will not interfere with these power sources in the future.

STC members logged over 200 hours in voluntary service to Wenonah during 2019 with time devoted to planting, pruning, tree surveys, supervision of contractors, responding to residents' concerns, training, public meetings and administration.

A continuing project dedicated to public safety and tree health is our Trimming Program. Whenever budget monies allow we contract out companies to trim dead or broken branches. With an estimated total of 2500 street trees this task will be an ongoing process and we will never know its true outcome in that nobody reports when an accident does not occur – whether it be around our school, library, streets or athletic fields. Our trimming efforts fall under safety and prevention and we will continue the program as budgeting allows.

Residents who wish to have major trimming or request removal of a street tree at their own expense must contact the STC for review and approval upon which a no fee permit will be granted. This process protects the interests of the homeowner as we require contractor proof of insurance and agreement on what work is to be done to protect the tree if pruning is all that is required. Full removals are granted upon review of issues like tree health, age, condition and safety.

Wenonah – like many towns in NJ are under watch for the Emerald Ash Borer which have decimated ash trees from Ohio and east. By all predictions it is not a matter of if - but when the ash borer arrives. As such we ask all residents with ash trees on their property to remain alert.

Our thanks go out to Mayor and council for their support and especially the dedicated Boro staff of Karen, Lori and Kathy.

Ken, Brian and Paul along with all Public Works employees deserve great credit in working with the STC throughout the year. – as do the Police and Fire Depts.

In 2019 Wenonah was awarded its 23<sup>rd</sup> year of Tree City USA designation by the State of NJ Forestry Service and the Arbor Day Foundation. It is thru the efforts of STC members past and present that Wenonah remains an oasis of greenery. The Wenonah STC is committed to maintaining our trees – a natural resource and point of pride for today and generations to come.

### **Summary**

The Wenonah Fire Company was in service a total of 228 times in the year 2019 including dispatched incidents, weekly training, and extra service assignments..

During the year 2019, the Wenonah Fire Company responded to 166 incidents within the Borough and our mutual aid communities. The company also assembled for training and activities 62 times for a year-end total of 1,772.78 staff hours of service.

The year 2019 marked the 131st year the Wenonah Fire Company has served the residents of the borough with 100% volunteer staffing. This year we saw a 26% increase in our run totals due in large part to requests for mutual aid from neighboring communities that seek our assistance due to the professionalism and reliability of our company.

This year, one residence did experience a fire resulting in property damage, but the quick response of the Wenonah Fire Company stopped the spread of the fire and isolated the

majority of the damage to one room. Throughout the year we have experienced a number of residents calling us for smoke and carbon monoxide alarms that were sounding. In many of those cases, the alarm was the result of an expired unit. We encourage the residents to regularly change their detector batteries and replace at the manufacturer's recommended intervals. That being said, we do not want to discourage anyone from making the call for peace of mind, especially regarding CO and gas. As we say, "when in doubt, call us out."


We welcomed a number of new faces to our ranks this year and I am pleased to report that we graduated two members from the Fire Academy; Peter Fu and Jackie Graves. Peter and Jackie both gave up 6 months worth of weekends to complete the rigorous training required for Firefighter 1. We are all proud of them, as you should be as well. We continue to be in need of new volunteers to help fill our ranks.

Your neighbors and friends serving in the fire company dedicate their time and talents to provide the Borough with a reliable, well-trained, and professional fire department while saving the taxpayers hundreds of thousands of dollars each year; that means missing family meals, work, and sleep to serve their neighbors in their time of need. As I finish my first year as Chief, I am pleased to report that the Borough's fire apparatus fleet is in good working condition and is current on all the required maintenance and testing.

I am grateful to the line officers for their sacrifices and dedication to the command and administrative tasks needed to run a safe and efficient fire department and to Chief Sole for his continued mentorship through this first year. I am also thankful for the support we receive from Mayor and council; your words and acts of encouragement go a long way to remind our members of the difference they are making in our town.

Report to Borough Council January 2, 2020

In 2019, the Wenonah Library circulated 5584 books, 981 A/V items, 1218 digital downloads, which includes audiobooks and eBooks, and was visited by 7821 patrons. We had 8 open public meetings, many participants in fun and educational programs, dozens volunteers helped out, we held 2 used book sales and a holiday open house.

The library continued to implement planned measures to preserve our beautiful old building. The library board of trustees contracted to repoint the front steps, repair and paint some plaster walls, as well as, replace the failing lighting in the lower level with safe new high efficiency fixtures.

In addition to our weekly preschool story time program on Wednesday mornings, and Computer Basics on Thursday evenings, twice monthly we offer the S.M.I.L.E. literacy program. On the first and third Monday of each month, the library is visited by a variety of dogs, to provide the opportunity for children to practice their reading in a fun low pressure environment. We were also able to bring a new version of the SAT preparation class to our high school aged residents.

A new program this year is Craft Night. Each Tuesday evening from 6:30-8:00 patrons may gather to create something from our design collection or bring their own projects. I hear it is a peaceful and relaxing way to spend time with friends away from the hectic pace of life. Incorporated into Craft Night is a service project using “plarn”; recycling plastic shopping bags, to weave into bags, bedrolls, or other useful items for distribution to those in need.

The Summer Reading Program, A Universe of Stories, was offered during the month of July for the elementary aged children of Wenonah, with fun stories, crafts and games. A highlight was a star gazing event after dark! Another outdoor activity is StoryWalk; beginning at the front of the library, follow each of 15 pages around the grounds of the library and through the park to read a story and take a walk.

We freshened up our holiday decorations to put our best foot forward for a Holiday Open House held on December 15<sup>th</sup>. Library staff shared some of their favorite treats and volunteer musicians from our talented Wenonah neighbors provided live music. We thank members of the Gateway Madrigals, the Hummel family, Mrs. Denise Berg, Mr. Ron Farina and The Jefferson Quartet for providing holiday music throughout the season. We also forwarded letters 122 to Santa that were answered by Christmas.

We received several nice donations this year to improve the librarians’ work area and that will make it possible to replace our public computers with updated equipment, and update the lighting.

Wenonah Library continues to be the place to find tax forms, borough newsletters, July 4<sup>th</sup> parade registration forms, and voter registration forms. When you need a copy or your printer runs out of ink, we can help. We take donations and collect Boxtops for Education and Campbell Soup labels for the Wenonah Home & School. We provide opportunities the Photo Contest entries and for our residents to display interesting collections. We now have a Keurig machine available. Stop in for a cup of something warm while you find something great to read and visit with friends.

As technology changes the methods we use to communicate and access information, the Wenonah Public Library continues to find ways to fulfill our mission statement. “...to provide quality materials and services which fulfill educational, informational, cultural, and recreational needs of the entire community in an atmosphere that is welcoming, respectful, and businesslike.”

Re: Year End Report

Dan,

The end of 2019 brings with it the perfect time to reflect on some of the hard work put forth by the members of your police department, who have been working with the residents of Wenonah to reinforce the borough as a great place to live and raise a family. To maintain as clean of an environment as possible, we had community service workers around town to pick up litter. We generally have them focus on the main thoroughfares, which included Barkbridge Rd., Maple St., Glassboro Rd., and Mantua Ave., but they also cleaned around the park, the lake, the pool, and helped at the Harvest Festival. To assist with the inevitable motor vehicle complaints that all towns experience, we placed our speed display signs and trailer at several locations as complaints came in while subsequently following up with radar posts and directed patrols. The crossing guards were reorganized due to a complaint with one guard being retrained about his responsibilities. This ultimately resulted in the problem guard significantly improving and being rotated back to his desired position in Wenonah, allowing for safer crossing during times when he is present. We met with the elementary school leadership on several occasions to discuss improvements to school security. Some of the issues addressed included the mandatory yearly update/review of the memorandum of understanding, concerns over a man approaching a student, and being present while students were starting back up at school for the new year. We also worked with the school on improving access control and obtained access to the school's surveillance system. The Captain and I attended a class titled "Echoes of Columbine," put on by the FBI, that provided valuable insight into lessons learned from past school shooting incidents. In the future, as soon as we procure new equipment and train a trainer, we will be using Simunitions to better train officers in real world response methods to active shooters. The need for this became even more evident in 2019 due to the shooting incident in Logan, to which several Mantua officers responded, one being inside of the building as part of the SWAT team. In order to better lead the department into the future, members of the administration also attended training on customer service, surviving critical incidents, leadership lessons from the founding fathers, leadership for the future, cyber security, OPRA, and also attended an elementary school session at the train station about the history of Wenonah. Patrol officers and members of the Detective Bureau also attended numerous training classes throughout the year as well.

In an effort to better improve community relations, the department implemented body cameras, attended the Wenonah Craft Fair on several occasions, spoke to seniors at both the senior breakfast and luncheon, held a Coffee With a Cop event, handed out cold water during a long heat wave, had officers at the Fall Festival, attended the Easter Egg hunt with Boomer, handed out candy during Halloween, and met with a community group during their "Back the Blue" event that sought to show their support for law enforcement. These relations also helped to increase participation in our voluntary surveillance camera registry that can be a huge asset in solving crimes. Officers assisted in successful Memorial Day and Fourth of July parades and festivities. I instituted a departmental chaplain program resulting in three police chaplains coming on board to assist officers and the community during times of need. We worked through the ongoing parking problem at the Tricia Sloan Dance Studio and will continue following up as necessary. It is obviously a known fact that everybody loves dogs! As a

result, our Canine Unit attended as many community-related events as possible and worked on establishing a partnership with the Wenonah Lion's Club. The department also installed a TTY device at the police station in an effort to better communicate with those who are deaf and/or hard of hearing. Finally, we had the state police conduct a drone demonstration for us to evaluate the capabilities of this new technology to evaluate if it has a place in our department.

In an effort to be fiscally responsible while also increasing the safety of those for which we assist, the police department received and participated in several grants while also applying for several others. We have been a longstanding participant in the Safe and Secure grant the provides funding towards two of our full-time officers. Officers also enforced distracted driving, seatbelt, and drunk driving laws during several different grant periods throughout the past year. Additionally, we received funding for bullet resistant vests through two other grants. Due to the new downtown crosswalks on Mantua Ave., we applied for a pedestrian safety grant, but were ultimately denied due to there not being enough reported incidents in the area over the past several years (not a bad thing!). We also applied for a grant through South Jersey Gas to be used towards the purchase of equipment, but were denied this year due to the number of applications they received. They advised that they try to rotate the departments that receive the money each year, so hopefully we will get it in 2020.

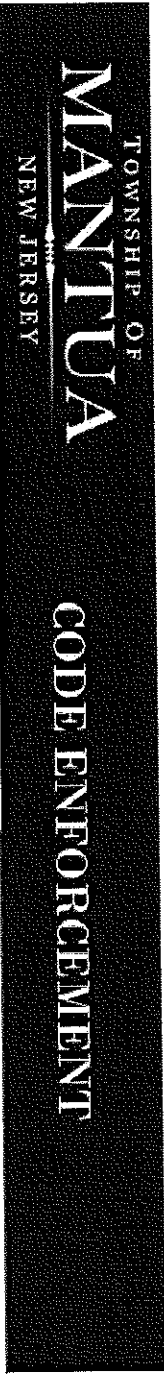
Some more positive occurrences during 2019 included the Detective Bureau moving its operations into the old Wenonah Police Station. Although there were/are a few minor issues to work through, the space has allowed for us to provide the detectives with a private space to work, expand the area for patrol officers, and provide peace of mind for borough residents in knowing that officers are still at a building in Wenonah on a consistent basis. Our newest canine, Boomer, graduated from the academy in the beginning of the year and has attended numerous community events since then. Ptl. Krista Shields was voted by her peers as the Mantua Officer of the Year and Cpl. Jason Lipsett was nominated as the Mantua VFW Officer of the Year. As we have done in past years, officers were allowed to grow additional facial hair during "Movember" to raise money for a men's health charity. Although we lost two experienced officers due to retirement, this also allowed us to hire two new patrol officers, promote Jim Hagerty to sergeant, Rob Layton, Brian Hauss, and Jason Lipsett to corporal, and assign Ray Lawrence to the Detective Bureau as an investigator. We also instituted a Class 3 officer program at Mantua's three schools, a program that was discussed with the Wenonah Elementary School as well. We are currently due for our reaccreditation with the New Jersey State Association of Chiefs of Police and are awaiting for their assessors to come out and evaluate our department's compliance. This program has resulted in a more well-informed and better prepared police department overall.

Going into 2020, the police department looks forward to our overall goal of continuing to build relationships and finding ways in which we can be more responsive, better prepared, better equipped, and better as a department overall so that we can continue providing the best possible service to those for which we are responsible.
