Property Taxes Due November 1st

Fourth quarter taxes are due on November 1st with a 10-day grace period. Any payment received after the 10th day shall accrue interest back to November 1st.

Payments are accepted by mail or in person during regular business hours. You may also leave your payment in the secured drop box located by the front door of the Municipal building. Please note that we do not accept credit/debit card payments at the Borough Office.

However, you can go to our website at www.boroughofwenonah.com to make a payment online (for a fee) or see the amount due.

If you are a new homeowner, please call to receive a copy of your tax bill.

If you receive a tax bill that says "Advice Only" and you pay your own taxes directly, you can use that as your tax bill.



If you receive an original tax bill and your mortgage company pays your taxes, please forward the bill to them.

Writing Checks For Payments



When writing a check for payment to the Borough, please write the handwritten portion carefully. The banks only accept the written word amount on the check.

Also, please include your lot/block number for tax payments and your account number for utility payments on the check's memo line. This step helps to ensure that payments are being made to the right property.


Campaign Yard Signage

With General Elections taking place in November, the Borough wanted to inform residents that there is Ordinance 72-711 in place regarding campaign yard signage.

First, there are no signs permitted in the **clear zone** (area between curb and sidewalk or if no walk, 12 feet from the curb) or on **public property**.

With regards to **private property**, the ordinance states the following for political signs:

- Signs may not be erected more than 45 days prior to the date of the election and must be removed within 5 days of election.
- Only one sign per candidate(s)
 may appear on any one property
 at any one time, except with
 regard to a corner lot, in which
 case no more than one sign per
 candidate may appear on each
 side of the property facing the
 street.



 No sign may exceed 9 square feet.

General Election Day Is Tuesday, November 7th

Here are the 3 ways you can vote in the upcoming General Election

1. AT YOUR POLLING PLACE ON ELECTION DAY

Vote in person at the Municipal building on Election Day, November 7 from 6:00 AM to 8:00 PM

2. IN-PERSON EARLY VOTING

This option enables all registered voters to cast their ballot in person, using a voting machine during a designated voting period prior to Election Day.

You can choose to vote, in person, when it's most convenient for your schedule. Find Gloucester County locations at VOTE.NJ.GOV.

3. VOTE-BY-MAIL BALLOT

Registered voters can apply for a vote-by-mail ballot by following the instructions found at VOTE.NJ.GOV or contacting the County Clerk's Election Division at 856-384-4530. Voters may also apply in person at the Board of Elections Office, 550 Grove Road, West Deptford until 3:00 PM the day before the election.

Municipal Office Federal Holiday Schedule



The Borough office will be closed on Monday, September 4th in observance of Labor Day and on Monday, October 9th in observance of Columbus Day. The office will also be closed Thursday, November 23rd and Friday, November 24th for the Thanksgiving holiday.

Water/Sewer Bill Due November 1st

Third quarter water/sewer bills will be mailed to residents by mid October. The due date is November 1st with a 10-day grace period. Any payment received after the 10-day grace period shall accrue interest back to November 1st.

The 3rd quarter bill includes the \$200 flat fee for sewer plus resident's actual household water usage for the prior three months (July 1st—September 30th), billed at the 2023 rates per 1,000 gallons.




Payments are accepted by mail or in person during regular business hours.

Residents can also make a payment online (for a fee) or see the amount due. Visit the Borough website and look for the tab labeled "Pay your bill online".


Conserve Water And Save Money

Yard Waste/Branch Collection Ends September

Please note that the bi-monthly schedule for containerized yard waste and branch collection comes to an end in September.

- Last date for branch collection is Monday, September 18th
- Last date for containerized yard waste is Monday, September 25th

Bulk branch and yard waste collection will resume in February 2024. For more details, please refer to the Borough's 2024 calendar when it becomes available.



Quick Tip
Follow the Borough calendar
(and not your neighbor (and))
Always check the Borough calendar for the most accurate dates for yard waste and branch collection. There has been an uptick with residents putting yard waste/branches out to the curb on the wrong collection day where it remains there for an entire week.



Bulk Leaf Collection Starts October 16th



 Beginning the week of October
 16th and ending the week of
 December 11th, bulk leaves will be collected on a continuous

rotating basis throughout the Borough. These dates are dependent upon the weather, Public Works schedule and in-town emergencies.

- Residents may include other compostable yard waste in with their bulk leaf collection such as plants, flowers, and pine needles.
- Please DO NOT mix wood branches, limbs

- or trash in with leaves. If these items are mixed in or on top of the leaves, they cannot be picked up.
- Please DO NOT put leaves in bags or containers during the bulk leaf collection period.
- Please place leaves in the street far enough from the curb line to allow water to flow to the storm water catch basin
- Leaves should be placed a minimum of 10 feet from all storm water catch basins.
- Please DO NOT place leaves near parked cars. Adequate space is required for the Borough's leaf removal equipment.

Bulk Trash Pickup Reminders

Lets talk trash - a few reminders

- Our bulk item collection date is the 3rd Tuesday of every month.
- You must call the Borough office (856-468-5228) to be placed on the bulk list. Please call anytime during the month to schedule bulk pickup. Please call no later than noon on the 3rd Monday of the month to be included.
- Bulk collection is designed for residents that need to discard household trash
 that is too large to place in their borough issued black can. Please note that bulk
 collection is NOT meant for a property clean out; the homeowner must take
 these items to the Gloucester County Solid Waste Complex in Swedesboro
 (856-478-6045) or rent a dumpster.

Examples of acceptable items:

- * Beds
- Sofas
- * Household Furniture
- Carpet cut into manageable sections (rolled, tied or taped)
- * Bagged Items

Items NOT acceptable:

- Hazardous Waste
- * Wood Fencing
- * Bricks or concrete
- Construction debris and demolition
- Got metal? Please contact the Public Works Department for any metal, e-waste (TVs, computers, DVDs) or appliance (washer and dryers, refrigerators) pickup. These items can be picked up on daily basis by Public Works. Residents don't need to wait for the monthly bulk item collection day to rid their home of these items. Please call PW during normal business hours at (856-468-5300) for item pickup.
- Bulk trash is just that... trash. Residents, please be considerate of your neighbors and of your community, DO NOT put your bulk trash out to the curb days in advance of bulk collection day. Per Ordinance 24-3, items placed out on a non-bulk week are in violation and will be required to be removed from curbside.



News From Mantua Township Police Department

On August 14th, the Mantua Township Committee administered the oath of office to seven officers - four police officers

and three promotees.



Robert Layton was promoted to Detective Sergeant, Bruce Shaw to Corporal and Stephen Wolfsgruber to Corporal.

The four officers newly sworn in are: Joseph Craig, formerly of the Westville Police Department, Arthur Ettore, formerly of the Paulsboro Police Department, Matthew Germscheid, formerly of the Camden Police Department and Jacob Jowett, formerly of the Woodbury Heights Police Department.

Meet your new police officers

Joseph Craig holds an associate degree in criminal justice and attended the Cape May Police Academy starting May 2015. He worked as a SLEO 2 officer in North Wildwood, Westville, and Woolwich Twp. police departments before being hired fulltime by the Westville PD in 2016. During his almost seven-year tenure with Westville, he was forced to learn a lot quickly as he was often the only officer working on his shift. He also comes with a significant amount of training, with many of his classes being ones that MTPD are either mandated to send, or aim to send their officers to. Some of these include being bicycle officer certified, Alcotest certified, Standardized Field Sobriety Testing certified and drug impaired driving certified. Additionally, having already been an officer in other Gloucester County PDs, he has knowledge and experience of the systems, dispatchers, and policies of the county, making his adjustment and field training period much quicker and easier.

Jacob Jowett holds a bachelor's degree in psychology and associate degree in health science. He started as a class 1 officer in the Paulsboro PD and attended the fulltime Gloucester County Police Academy in 2021. Jacob worked in the Woodbury Heights PD up until receiving MTPD's offer of employment. He was offered a job here during MTPD's last hiring process but declined due to having just accepted Woodbury Heights' offer and not wanting to retract his acceptance after they had already spend money to start outfitting him. This is a quality of dedication that the department finds important. As with Joseph Craig, already being an officer in another Gloucester County PD, has provided Jacob with knowledge and experience of the systems, dispatchers, and policies of the county making his adjustment and field training period much easier.

Matthew Germscheid is a veteran of the US Army National Guard and holds a bachelor's degree in criminal justice. He initially attended the Cape May Police Academy in 2009 and worked as a SLEO 2 officer in both Wildwood and Glassboro. Matthew was subsequently hired by the Camden PD and sent to the academy in 2013, where he worked until 2015. After a brief career change as a business owner, Matthew returned back through the academy for Camden and worked there from February 2022 until his employment with MTPD. While working in Camden, he was assigned to various divisions, including the Community Impact Division and the Neighborhood Response Division on top of his patrol assignment. Attending the fulltime police academy, a second time shows that Matthew wants to remain in the law enforcement field. With all the other things that he has done, he also brings with him many different experiences from other aspects of life that will assist him in his career in Mantua.

Arthur Ettore attended the Cape May Police Academy in 2018 as a class 2. He worked at the East Greenwich PD as a SLEO 1, the Wildwood PD as a SLEO 2, and the Paulsboro PD as a SLEO 2 before being hired fulltime by Paulsboro, where he worked from October 2019 until his employment with MTPD. He also holds some of the classes and mandatory certifications to which MTPD strives to send all their new officers, including being drug impaired driving and Alcotest certified. Arthur is also a certified range instructor, which is a skill that always comes in handy. Once again, already being an officer in another Gloucester County PD provides him with knowledge and experience of the systems, dispatchers, and policies of the county, making an adjustment and field training much easier.

Wenonah Shade Tree Commission

Following a prolonged period of no rain the STC watered the new tree plantings in the tornado damaged areas several times. Luckily things improved and nature provided the help we all needed for trees and all our gardens.

Several members of the STC have taken on new life challenges and we appreciate all their help: Pat Ream, Jeff Craig, Beth Brabston and Heidi Congalton.

In order keep your street trees healthy PLEASE limit the use of mulch volcano piles around the tree trunk base as it restricts water absorption while providing a home for insects. 2-3 inches is all that is needed while leaving a well shape at the trunk base for water to soak in during rains.

Residents should NOT be planting anything in the clear zone as it may interfere with public utilities.

Remember the harm that planting ivy around or allowing ivy to grow on tree trunks can cause.

English ivy is one of many nonnative species introduced in the United States for its decorative appeal. Like many innocently imported species, English ivy can be invasive, damaging trees and structures with extended growth.



Although the ivy itself does not kill a tree, the resulting actions after the ivy has started growing can. By creating competition for nutrients, water and sunlight, ivy makes a tree weaker and more prone to disease and branch dieback. English ivy also contributes to added moisture around the bark, attracting bugs and accelerating rot. It grows from the ground up, so branch dieback is usually evident at the bottom of the tree first. The best method for remediation is essentially to neuter the plant. Once a tree has been infiltrated, the best remediation is to kill the ivy without removing it.



Clip it at the bottom around the circumference of the trunk and pull the roots out of the ground in a circle 2 feet around the tree. Leave the ivy intact on the tree, since removing it can cause the hold fasts to pull off pieces of bark, further weakening the tree. The ivy will wilt and die and in time the tree trunk will grow around the old vines.

Please do not use tape around the base of trees to kill the spotted lantern fly. It is more harmful to birds, butterflies and productive insects.

COMMUNITY SOLAR COMES TO WENONAH

Wenonah's residents can now participate in a local solar project. The state's community solar program brings the benefit of solar energy and lower electric bills to residents without installing solar panels on their roofs.

Last June, the NJ Board of Public Utilities approved the construction of a Community Solar projects in Millville to serve Wenonah residents. This project was built by Solar Landscape on the roof of a warehouse to power the local community through the Atlantic City Electric grid. They can only accommodate a total of 302 customers on a first come first served basis. Currently, these projects are reserving space for households that wish to participate in the program.

Participants are eligible for a 21%



savings on the electricity provided to your Atlantic City Electric account from these projects. There are no additional fees or long-term commitments required. Solar Landscape is required to reserve 51% of the project for residents that are low or moderate income.

Atlantic City Electric also has information about this program on their website and say the following:

"As part of our commitment, we support community solar as an opportunity for customers to benefit from solar energy. For over a century, energy was primarily generated at large central plants, often at considerable distance from the customer. With community solar, a solar generating system provides benefits to community members. Community options expand access to solar power for renters, those with shaded roofs or properties, and those who choose not to install a system at their home or business for financial or other reasons."

Summer at the Wenonah Library means **Summer Reading**!



This year's theme was "All Together Now." Participants had a fantastic time listening to stories and creating crafts while talking about the importance of working together to make our world a better place. Thirty-one children enrolled in the program which ran for a total of 14 sessions covering two age groups, including a finale featuring "Magic Jim," prizes, and ice cream. Twenty-six children attended the finale, and each was able to choose a book to keep. This year our Reading Challenge looked a little different. Instead of ending during the Summer Reading Finale, we decided to extend the reading challenge through the end of August. Children twelve and under were able to earn up to three different prizes by logging their minutes reading. As of August 9th, children logged 51 hours reading and 17 prizes have been awarded.

In other news, the library has added a third museum pass to our collection. Patrons can now visit **Rockwood Park & Museum** in Wilmington, DE. Built by Joseph Shipley, a Quaker merchant banker, in the 1850's, the mansion's Gothic Revival architecture and

enchanting landscape were designed to reflect the beauty of an English country estate. The Museum reflects the way the Bringhurst family, descendants of Shipley, lived during the turn of the 20th century. The library's pass admits up to four people to Rockwood's self-guided or guided tours during regular hours of operations.



The Rockwood Museum pass joins the library's two other passes to the **Brandywine Conservancy** and **Museum of Art** in Chadds Ford, PA, and the **Museum of the American Revolution** in Philadelphia.

Another new benefit for our patrons is our new **Text Notification System.** Do you have trouble remembering when your library books are due? Stop into the library and we will add text notification services to your account. You will receive a text when your items are overdue or when an item hold is available for pickup.

As Fall begins, we are looking forward to the return of **Toddler Storytime**. Beginning September 20th and running each Wednesday morning at 10:00am through May, we invite your toddler to join Miss Holly for stories, songs, games, and crafts.

SAT prep sessions will again be offered this Fall to help older students prepare for the changes

being planned for this test. Keep watching our website and Facebook page for more information.

Keep an eye out too for this year's **Spooky Story Night** coming in October. Last year's event will be difficult to beat, but the Friends of the Wenonah Library are up for the challenge! What's New

Congratulations go out to our 6th Grade Frank Eggert Memorial Student Environmental Award winners for 2023: **Avarie Parsons and Maya Sanchez**. They each received \$100 in recognition of their academic achievement in environmental sciences and their volunteer efforts toward environmental causes.

Visitors to the long boardwalk on the **Eldridge Trail** now have a great close-up view of a beaver dam across Monongahela Brook. What may initially appear as a disorganized jumble of sticks is actually the result of good engineering. Beavers equate deep water with safety, which is why they seek to create "lakefront real estate" wherever they live. Their ponds create good habitats for other animal species, and reduce flooding downstream after heavy rains.

This particular dam does not cause any trouble for users of the Eldridge Trail, thanks to the aforementioned boardwalk which we and the Lions Club installed in 2017 in response to a different beaver dam. The dam's pond does cut off the low-lying portion of the Monongahela Brook Loop



Trail. However, the higher portion of that trail from Eldridge to Woodbury-Glassboro Road is still walkable even now.

Finally, users of the **Mantua Creek Trail** may remember the piles of overturned trees following the 2021 tornado. If you haven't been through that area this summer, be sure to take a look during September. You will be surprised by the lush growth made possible by the sparse forest canopy. Beyond the vines and thorns, the young trees of the future forest are getting their start right now.




Saturday morning coffee klatches.
