Free Rabies Clinic and Pet Licensing Reminder


- Our free rabies clinic will be held on **Saturday**, **March 23rd** at the Wenonah Fire House from **12:30 PM to 1:30 PM** for all Gloucester County residents.
 - The Borough office will also be open during this time for the purchase of pet licenses.

As a reminder, all dogs/cats over 6 months must be licensed.



To be issued a license, your pet's rabies vaccination needs to be valid through October 31, 2024.

The license fee is \$7.00 for a pet that is spayed or neutered and \$12.00 for an un-altered pet.



Residents may stop by the Borough office anytime during business hours to purchase their pet's license.

Water/Sewer Bill Due April 30th



First guarter 2024 water/sewer bills will be mailed to residents by mid April. The due date is April 30th with a 10-day grace period. Any payment received after the 10-day grace period shall accrue interest back to April 30th.

The 1st quarter bill includes: \$150 flat fee for sewer. \$125 flat fee for water (includes 6,000 gallons of actual usage each quarter) plus resident's actual household water usage over 6,000 gallons for the prior three months (January 1-March 31, 2024), billed at the 2024 rates per 1,000 gallons.

Payments are accepted by mail or in person during regular business hours.

Residents may also leave their payment in the secured drop box located by the front door of the Municipal building.

Residents can also make a payment online (for a fee) or see the amount due. Visit the Borough website and look for the tab labeled "Pay your bill online".

March 2024 is Tire Amnesty Month

Auto and pickup tires can be dropped of at the Gloucester County Solid Waste Complex located at 493 Monroeville Road (Rt. 694), South Harrison Twp.

There is NO CHARGE to drop off your tires.

Participation is limited to **Gloucester County residents** ONLY.

Tires may be on or off the rim, but MUST be separated by type.

Taxes Due May Ist

Second quarter taxes are due on May 1st with a 10-day grace period. Any payment received after the 10th day shall accrue interest back to May 1st.

Payments are accepted by mail or in person during regular business hours. You may also leave your payment in the secured drop box located by the front door of the Municipal building.

You can also go to our website at www.boroughofwenonah.com to make a payment online (for a fee) or see the amount due.

If you are a new homeowner, please call to receive a copy of your tax bill.

If you receive a tax bill that says "Advice Only" and you pay your own taxes directly, you can use that as your tax bill.

If you receive an original tax bill and your mortgage company pays your taxes, please forward the bill to them.

Public Service Announcement - Wishcycling

First of all, what's Wishcycling ??

Wishcycling is putting non-recyclable items in the recycling in the hopes those items will be recycled. Sometimes, we want things to be recyclable, so we put them in the recycling bin.

Wishcycling comes from a place of good intentions but, unfortunately, putting these objects in with the rest of the recycling can do more harm than good.



Here's a list of some key offenders – too many of these items will contaminate a batch of recycling. That means waste managers will not be able to find buyers for the materials and the contaminated loads could be sent to the landfill instead.

Disposable Coffee Cups: Your disposable cup might seem like it can be recycled, but most single-use cups are lined with a fine film of polyethylene which makes the cups liquid-proof but also difficult and expensive to reprocess.

Greasy Pizza Boxes: Pizza boxes soak up the grease from the pizza, making them unrecyclable and easy to contaminate other items around them.

Oily Takeout Containers: Even if a container is labeled correctly for recycling, food residue can contaminate a load. Washing out food scraps from recyclables can be just as important as putting the right thing in the recycling bin - keep food and liquids out.

Yogurt Containers (and non-recyclable plastics): The Borough does not accept plastics numbered 3 to 7, which can include things like yogurt cups, butter tubs and cool whip bins.

Plastic Bags: These are the **BIGGEST** offenders. Plastic bags create issues for waste managers by plugging up their machines. And most importantly, **DO NOT** bag your recyclables - keep your recyclables loose and free. FYI, plastic bags can be recycled at most grocery stores.



Yard Waste/Branch Collection Starts April 1st

Starting <u>April 1st</u>, branches will be picked up on the 1st and 3rd week of the month and then starting <u>April 8th</u>, containerized yard waste will be picked up on the 2nd and 4th week of the month.

- Please have any yard waste/ branch collection out to curbside by 6:00AM Monday.
- Yard waste is defined as small branches, shrub clippings, leaves and garden vegetation.
- Public Works does not collect grass clippings or compost material. Please mulch or compost them on your property.



- Place your yard waste at the curb in either plastic or paper bags or containers. Bags and containers will be returned.
- For branch collection, please cut branches in 4-6 foot lengths with a diameter no larger than 2".
- Please do not place branches in containers.
- The disposal of wood remaining from tree removal is the responsibility of the contractor and/or homeowner.

Quick Tip: Follow the Borough Calendar (and not your neighbor)



Always check the borough calendar or website for the most accurate dates for yard waste and branch collection. And please remember that there is <u>NO</u> yard waste/branch collection whatsoever on the fifth Monday of the months of **April**, **July** or **September**.

Bulk Trash Collection Helpful Reminders



- Our bulk item collection is the 3rd Tuesday of every month.
- You must call the Borough office (856-468-5228) to be placed on the bulk collection list. Please call no later than noon on the 3rd Monday of the month to be included.
- Please call the Borough office during normal business hours and speak directly to the one of the clerks in the office, either Huda or Carol.

The phone call will take just a few minutes of your time to collect the information ed from you.

- Please do not leave voice mail messages with the Borough office OR the Public Works Department regarding bulk trash collection.
- If you have bulk items to dispose of and cannot wait for a bulk pick-up day, you may take material to the Gloucester County Solid Waste Complex (856-478-6045) in Swedesboro.
- Bulk collection is NOT meant for a property clean out; the homeowner must take these items to the complex in Swedesboro or rent a dumpster.
- Metal items are not accepted for bulk trash collection. Your Public Works Department can pick up these items up on daily basis. Contact Public Works at (856) 468-5300.

Fire Hydrant Flushing Tentatively Scheduled for April

Tentatively scheduled for April 15th, the Department of Public Works will flush fire hydrants for approximately two weeks.

The DPW annually performs regular maintenance on hydrants to remove sediment and rust from the water and maintain proper chlorine concentrations.

During the flushing process, water customers may experience some disturbances in their usual water service such as a short term decrease in water pressure or discolored water.

Although the water does not pose a health risk, it is recommended to avoid drinking the water until it runs clear from the tap.

- Don't prepare baby food or formula if the water is discolored. Use bottled water or pre-prepared food and formula. You can also boil the water for 5 minutes to ensure safety.
- Do not wash clothes if the water is discolored as mineral sediments in the water could possibly cause some discoloration to white/light colored clothing.
- It is okay to the use the water for showering, bathing and toilet flushing.

To clear up the discoloration, open several cold-water faucets in your home allowing new water to work its way into your pipes.

Wenonah's Office of Emergency Management is voluntarily staffed by three individuals with a wide range of emergency management, public

safety, and emergency first response experience. We are tasked with ensuring Wenonah follows FEMA's National Preparedness Goal as related to Threats and Hazards (Natural, Technological, and Humancaused) and the "local" responsibility of Emergency Management's 5 Mission Areas (Prevention; Protection; Mitigation; Response; and Recovery). We will also endeavor to ensure our residents receive timely communication regarding any hazardous conditions which may affect Wenonah.

As a way of introduction, here is a little bio on Wenonah's Emergency Management team:

Rob and his wife, Susan, have been residents of Wenonah since 1989. Rob grew up in North Wildwood and received a Master of Arts degree in Educational Administration and Supervision from Seton Hall University in 1999 and a Bachelor of Arts degree in Business Administration/Economics from Western Maryland College in 1983. He is currently a Public Assistance Specialist with Continuity Operations Group, partnering with the New Jersey State Police Office of Emergency Management managing and coordinating public assistance disaster relief throughout New Jersey. Rob was the Director of Public Safety for Camden County for thirteen years after retiring from the New Jersey State Police as a Captain in 2010 after 26 years.

Rich is a lifelong resident of Wenonah and his wife, Karel, joined him as a Wenonah resident in 1989. Rich is a 1974 graduate of Gateway. From 1984 to 2018, Rich was a longtime employee with PSEG and Industrial Staffing Services, Inc. at the Salem, and Hope Creek Nuclear Generating stations, serving in a multitude of health and safety, fire protection and services, hazardous materials technician, and supervisory positions over his career. Rich has been a member of the Wenonah Fire Company since 1972, including a tenure as Fire Chief from 1988 to 1993. Rich also was Wenonah's Emergency Management Coordinator from 1986 through 1993, and again from 2015 until 2024.

Cameron and his wife, Toni, moved to Wenonah in the spring of 2023. He grew up in Woodbury Heights and is a 2009 graduate of Gateway and a 2013 graduate of Elizabethtown College where he received a Bachelor of Arts in Political Science. Cameron has been a New Jersey State Trooper since July 2022 and is currently assigned to Bridgeton Station where he serves as School Resource Officer. He has been a member of the United States Marine Corps for six years and is currently a Captain (Combat Engineer Officer) in the Marine Corps Reserves.

Shade Tree Commission

The Commission contracted this past winter for the removal of several dozen trees, and we will continue our trimming of trees as budgeting allows. The removed trees were either diseased, dead or a potential hazard.

Planting in the spring will focus on replacing tornado damaged trees which have been previously removed and exploring open space locations throughout town.

The Wenonah Planting Fund will be contributing to the funding of new trees.



As summer approaches we would ask all homeowners to avoid the practice of creating a "volcano" shaped

application of mulch to any tree base. Mulch should always be kept from touching the trunk and no more than 2-3 inches should be applied. Young trees will need a constant supply of water (five gallons a week) to survive extreme summer weather.

Also please remove any existing

ivy growing up street trees.

Residents who wish to trim/ remove street trees themselves or thru contractors must in advance obtain a **FREE PERMIT** thru the STC. We will come out to your home and review the trimming plan or issues relevant to removal qualification.

The Commission meeting dates for the balance of 2024: March 5, April 2, May 7, August 6, September 3 and November 5.

All meetings start at 7:00 pm and are held at the Wenonah Community Center.
